Discover Your Family's Story: At the Wichita Public Library

The Genealogy / Special Collections Section of the Wichita Public Library is located on the second floor in the Research Pavilion. This is a special collections area, so no food or open drinks allowed while you are using the collection's resources. You may use your phone or camera to take photos of books and microfilm. Our book copier can make digital copies that you can save to your flash drive at no charge. All items in Special Collection are for reference use only and may not be checked out. Some titles are also available in the circulating collection, and if need be, an item may be requested through Inter-library loan for checkout purposes.

The Genealogy Collection has over 46,000 volumes, and covers every state in the nation with very good coverage on New England and the Mid-Atlantic states, and on the Midwestern states where immigrants to Kansas originated. The Kansas Reference Collection has an additional 20,000 volumes and covers a variety of topics on Kansas and the Great Plains. The Foulk American Indian Reference Collection is a growing collection of over 1,000 volumes on history, culture, art, and language of Native Americans. Large number under 970 Dewey number.

Remember that most history is local history. Always check the local library, museum, and archive for local published items, manuscripts, and ephemera, especially for those one-of-a-kind items. Search World Cat https://search.worldcat.org/ for library materials, and ArchiveGrid for materials found in archives. Many libraries and archives are digitizing their records and placing them online so check their websites for possible resources.

The Dewey Decimal Numbering System is the most common way of arranging books in a public library. Using Dewey Decimal, books are arranged by topic or geographic location. Most follow this common system, but some libraries may use local variations such as alphabetical by state and county.

929.1 How to's. May be used by smaller libraries for all their genealogy materials.

280s Church Histories. 400+ volumes. Huguenot Society and their Registers. Hinshaw's Encyclopedia of American Quaker Genealogy. Mennonite Encyclopedia. New Catholic Encyclopedia. Jewish Encyclopedia. Many have biographies of church members.

312 Census Indexes. By state, or county, from 1790 to 1910, where print indexes stop due to size of population.

373 (High school) **378** (College) Yearbooks. Earliest is 1910s. Have photographs and signatures.

641 Cookbooks. Local cookbooks may have names of submitters of family recipes. Trace memberships in churches, women's societies, and organizations.

910s Atlases. Historical Atlas of Kansas. Historical Atlas of Oklahoma.

920s Biographies. Who's Who of Wichita. Dictionary of American Biography. Dictionary of National Biography (Great Britain)

929.4 Surnames. Dictionary of Jewish Surnames. Spanish Surnames in the American Southwest.

929.2 Family Histories. Almost 4,000 volumes. Use cutter of first or most common surname. Example: 929.2 MILLER. Check catalog for surnames using subject search. Example: Maupin Family

American Ancestors in ALL only. Good New England coverage. Ancestry Library Edition in every library branch. Over 9,000 databases within. Newspapers.com offers keyword searching of historic newspapers. Has Wichita Eagle and Beacon newspapers from 1870s thru 1922

Wichita Eagle – can access full images (2018-now) from home with WPL card in Newsbank Use Kansas State Library Card at kslc.org to access other genealogical databases like Fold3 (military), Heritage Quest (city directories, census), and Genealogy Connect (books, how to's)

Digital Archives

Can be found on library website under Research >> Local History >> Digital Archives The web address is: https://cdm17408.contentdm.oclc.org/ Digitizing items from public domain or have permission to post. It's a rapidly growing collection. Can add items from public to post online. Photographs, diaries, letters, etc. Examples of digitized items: U.S.S. Wichita Cruise Book Covid interviews and surveys – 45 oral history interviews, 89 surveys, 100s of images DAR booklets – transcriptions, histories Wichita booklets – histories, advertising brochures Wichita publication: city ordinances (1900 & 1912) and building codes (1917 & 1925) Wichita airport – 2 dozen aerial photographs, histories Wichita park department – 5 dozen photographs, mainly of local schools Wichita water department - over 4,000 photographs, mainly floods Wichita Chamber of Commerce – almost 900 photographs, mostly of businesses and events Sedgwick County books – 1931 Book-o-Maps, 1915 directory of land owners Wichita history – Downtown Wichita magazine April 1949, Mrs. B. H. Campbell diary 1897 Photographs – digitized over 5,000 photographs and placing them online. Currently adding over
