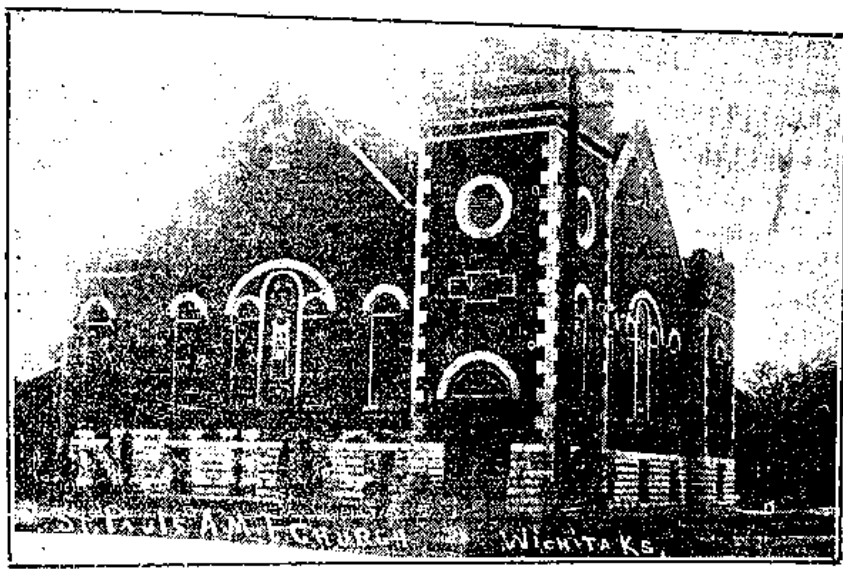

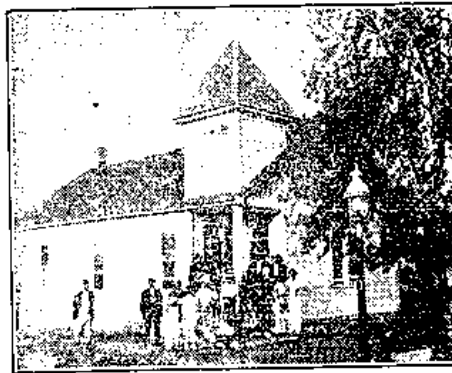


THE ST. PAUL A. M. E. CHURCH

He has accomplished much good during his leadership here, both in civic and missionary work having added 200 members to the church with a total at this time of 650 members. Rev. Brooks has been delegate to the Kansas General Conference over 20 years and has the leading church in Kansas. mosely . Under his supervision the church has prospered spiritually, financially and numerically, was founded and organized in the year of 1919. Doctrine of the church—the first record we have of the church of God in Christ was at Jerusalem on the day of Pentecost, when all of the disciples had assembled to receive the mighty outpour from Heaven, the Holy Ghost. We next find him aboard a train enroute for Los Angeles to seek the Holy Ghost. He sought and found it through his untiring effort. Today, there are churches of like faith and order all vore the United States and the isles of the sea and many foreign lands are echoing the blessing there. So this is that that was spoken by the Prophet Joel in the last days "I will pour out my spirit upon all flesh," scriptures in reference to the name of the church Acts: 20:28. 1 Cor. 1:2. 1 Thess. 2:14. Doctrine of the Church of God in Christ: We believe in repentance toward God, faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, perfect obedience to all of his Commandments. The churches of God in Christ are opposed to all radical higher criticism of the Bible and against all modernism and infidelity in the Church, against people unsaved and full of sin and worldliness belonging to the church. St. Mark's M. E. Church was organized in 1908 by Rev. J. J. Cabbel with twenty-five charter members. It was first named Cabbel Chapel. The first pastor in 1909 was Rev. G. T. Wooten, in 1911 Rev. S. E. Saunders took charge and in 1913 Rev. W. L. Darius took the church, serving three years and was successful in adding to the church twenty-five members. Rev. Walton Brown, who became pastor in 1921 moved the church from 15th and Wabash to 11th and Wabash, also changed the name, from Cabbel Chapel to St. Mark's M. E. Church.

At the annual Conference last year, which was held from Oct. 18th to 19th, the Rev. W. C. Connell, formerly pastor at Manhattan, Kans., was transferred to this church. He began his work here on Oct. 24 and has added sixty-nine members to the church. We have a well attended Sunday School and our young people's organizations as a whole are well attended. Rev. W. C. City of Wichita Fire Dept.—Engine Co. No. 3—1859 N. Topeka Ave.—
This is the only colored fire station in Wichita and was established over 30 years ago. Engine Co. No. 3 is rated among the highest in the state for efficiency and promptness. Mr. G. W. Robinson is captain and J. S. Anderson, Lieutenant. Other members of the force are Wm. Colter, Charley Knox, Benj. Ballard, Benny Williams, Wm. Whitted and Blen Miller.

The Colored Contingent of the Wichita Police Department consists of four capable officers, one detective and three patrolmen.

Mr. Jeff Thompson, 840 Wabash, city detective has been with the department for nearly a quarter of a century and during all these years has been a terror to evil doers in the vicinity of Wichita. He has ferreted out many difficult cases of murder, burglary, etc., and placed the criminal behind prison bars. He is truly an asset to the department.

Mr. C. W. Giles, patrolman, has been in the service seven years and has made a splendid record for efficient service.

Mr. Thos. Anderson has worked in the department four years and has made a splendid record as an efficient and fearless officer.

Roy E. Ballance, junior patrolman, has been on the force two years and has made a most servicable reputation as competent and qualified officer. He knows his duty well and is fearless in the discharge of same.

PHYLLIS WHEATELY CHILDREN'S HOME — 898 East 13th

This institution has been caring for homeless and orphan colored children for more than 20 years. This home was reorganized in 1920 and since its reorganization we have cared for over 200 children, at the present time there are 45 children in the home. The home is in charge of an efficient matron, with three other assistants and is controlled by a board of twenty member. The home is at all times neat and clean and has a home like atmosphere. The home receives appropriations from the state, city and county, besides the citizens membership. This institution is non-sectarian and the children receive their education from the public school. In the very near future the Board plans to build a spacious fire-proof building. We have a large dormitory for girls and one for boys and an airy isolation room. We also have shower baths and the house is modern throughout. Matron, Mrs. Martha B. Robinson, Mrs. Eddie Knight Bowers, Pres., Mrs. F. O. Miller, Chairman of Finance Committee.

L'OVERTURE SCHOOL.—13th and Mosely

L'Overture was built in 1912, and was opened in September of that year with 320 pupils and nine teachers. During the 15 years the student body grew to 727 and the faculty to 20. It's crowded condition last year brought about the taking over of Ingal's school (Now Dunbar) by colored pupils, thus dividing the L'Overture district. The present enrolment is 505 pupils with a faculty of 15 teachers, of the original faculty, the principal is the only one remaining.

The monthly pay roll last year was \$2,888 per month or \$34,656 for the year. Several of the teachers have made wide investments. The school is modern in every respect, and fully equipped, not only carrying on its regular academy work, but for Kindergarden, Domestic Art and Science, and Manual Training, pictures adorn the walls of every room. In the auditorium is an up to date moving picture machine which is used every week, a new piano just provided this year and a new velour curtani for the stage. The front yard is covered with beautiful bermuda grass and in every corner is planted a clump of choice shrubbery. This is cared for by the park commission of the city. The present teachers are F. C. West, Principal; Harriet Harper, Mary Brown, Josephine Cummings, Dolly Thompson, Jessie Perry, Myrtle Hurst, Edna Lannagan, Edna Schweich, Jennie McClain, Clara Armstead, Carrie Burney, Neola Parks, Estelle Weise and Frank Garrett. The custodian is A. M. Morris.

Wichita also has two other colored schools: Douglas and Dunbar.

BURLEIGH-HAYES SCHOOL OF MUSIC — COR. 12TH AND WABASH

MARY B. TALBERT BRANCH Y. W. C. A.—818 N. Water

The purpose of the Young Women's Christian Association is to associate young women in personal loyalty to Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord. To promote growth in Christian Character and Service through physical, social, mental and spiritual training, and to become a social force for the extension of the Kingdom of God. This is a comfortable home for young women away from home and outside organizations are invited to use the Assembly and Club rooms.

The building contains two offices, dressing room, committee room, assembly, kitchen and reception rooms on first floor, a club room, seven bedrooms and two baths on second floor. 27 girls were housed during the year.

COLERIDGE-TAYLOR CONSERVATORY OF MUSIC—12th and Wabash

Dorothy L. L. Sims, the daughter of Rev. and Mrs. R. T. Sims, of Canton, Miss., is a graduate of Almeda Gardner School for girls and of Tougaloo College of her native state. After finishing there she specialized in piano four years at Fisk University, Nashville, Tenn. On coming to Wichita, she entered Fairmount Conservatory and graduated from there in 1922, and is the only Negro holding a diploma from this Conservatory, and from the National Academy of Music in New York City. Miss Sims is a composer of rising prominence.

The Coleridge-Taylor Conservatory was founded in June, 1921 by Dorothy L. Sims, who is still president and instructor of the Institution. Miss Sims has been considered in a class with Booker T. Washington, Nannie Burroughs and Mary M. Bethune in founding this institution, for surely her inspiration, enthusiasm and ambition are equally as strong as was theirs, in opening places for the development and advancement of education of her race—the real musical race of America.

The Coleridge-Taylor Conservatory was named for one of the first and greatest Negro Musicians the World has ever known, Samuel Coleridge-Taylor, eminent composer, born in London, Aug. 15, 1875. He is an English Negro.

AMERICAN LEGION AND AUXILIARY

Arthur Gossett Post No. 273, American Legion, was organized in 1920. The Post bought their colors in 1922. B. H. Neeley was appointed Commander for 1927 and 1928 and has accomplished much for the post by his faithful work and leadership. This is one of the leading American Legion Posts in the state of Kansas and the largest colored Post in the middle west. Any ex-service man who saw service in the World War is eligible to membership and is invited to any of their meetings. We meet the 1st and 3rd Tuesday nights in each month, at the Y.M.C.A., Central and Water Sts., at 8 o'clock.

Auxiliary Unit of Arthur Gossett Post No. 273. Membership is limited to mothers, wives, daughters, and sisters of members of the American Legion and to the mothers, wives, daughters and sisters of all men and women who were in the military or naval service of the United States between Nov. 6, 1917 and Nov. 11, 1918, and died in line of duty or after honorable discharge, and to those women who of their own rights, are eligible to membership in the American Legion. The Auxiliary meets at the Y. W. C. A., the 1st and 3rd Tuesday nights in each month.

WICHITA KANSAS, YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION

Organized 1909. Located at 502 N. Water Street
Boys' Division 506 N. Water—Telephone Market 4659

(By W. L. Hutcherson, Executive Secretary)

In 1889, Mr. Chas. Caswell, (Now a practicing physician, with offices in the Northern Building) then one of the Secretaries of the Wichita Young Men's Christian Association, called together several young colored men to organize a bible class. The first meeting was held at 541 North Water St., in the home of Mr. George Jones, on the grounds where St. Paul's A. M. E. Church now stands.

As far as can be ascertained those present at the first meeting were: G. T. Smith, Henry Smith, L. P. Powell, Art Kates, Willie Jones, J. T. Chinneth and M. S. Jones. There were three others present, but their names cannot be secured.

This class continued during the winter of 1890. Mr. Caswell left for school, but he arranged that the class attend the White Y. M. C. A. The group very cordially received, and out of it came the—then future church leadership of the community. The class was finally numbered among the regular classes of the Y. M. C. A.

As the negro population steadily increased, a very pressing need was felt for some definite work for the young men and boys of the city. So Mrs. Abbie Adams, then one of the leading workers of St. Paul's Church, was approved by a group of boys, led by John D. Jones, who expressed a desire for some form of activities for the ever increasing number of boys in the community. So in December, 1909, Mrs. Adams called a meeting in St. Paul's Church and presented the claims of the boys' group, to the men present, and at that meeting, plans were made which led the organization of a Y. M. C. A. branch, for Colored Men and Boys.

When the plans had been perfected and presented to the Wichita Association, Dr. W. A. Hunton, then Senior Secretary of the Colored Men's Department, was consulted and in the spring of 1910, Mr. J. G. Wiley, of Pittsburg, Penn., was called to the leadership of the newly organized branch.

The first home of the association was in the Colman Building, 535 N. Main Street.

Some of the men who headed up the Association were Rev. J. A. Smith, then pastor of St. Paul's; the late V. C. Griffin, Dr. G. G. Brown and Rev. E. F. Fishback; Messrs. C. R. Price, Thos. Glover, J. T. Chinneth, G. L. Scott, N. D. Briley, A. K. Lawrence, J. A. Martin, J. L. Hicks, John D. Jones, H. W. James, S. W. Lee and G. W. White.

From the very beginning the work has enjoyed the sympathetic support and most hearty cooperation of the Staff and Board of the Central Association. Mr. H. W. Darling, for years the treasurer of the Wichita Association and at that time a member of the Committee on Colored Work, paid \$25.00 per month on the salary of the Secretary.

Mr. Wiley was succeeded by Mr. Mathew Bell, who served the Association for about one year, and upon his resignation, Captain N. Clark Smith was called to the secretaryship. During his term of office, the Association headquarters were moved from 535 to 615 N. Main St., Masonic Hall. Here, with enlarged facilities, a band was organized, gym classes and athletic teams started. After two years of very effective work Capt. Smith resigned, and Mr. Ernest Woodard was employed. He served but a short time, and Rev. Walter Brannon and Rev. J. E. Edwards both served on a part time basis. Then came the war, and the younger men went to camps. The work was greatly curtailed. But the Association had made a place for itself in the community.

Seeing the great need for the Association influence and program, Mr. A. A. Hyde, himself a leading spirit, not only in the local and State work, but also, a member of the, then International Committee, bought the building and five lots in the middle of the five hundred block on North Water Street and gave the same to the association, to be used for the Colored work. This property was secured in 1917.

After the war, Mr. E. M. Barnes, Instructor in Manual Arts, in the Colored Schools, was employed, to give half time to the work. With a feeling that the work required more time than he could give, Mr. Barnes resigned and for almost a year, the work was without employed leadership.

Believing that the work demanded a full time, trained and experienced Secretary the call was extended to the present Secretary who came to Wich-

ita, June 1, 1921, from Buxton, Iowa, having served there for part of three years. In 1925, the present location was secured. The building and grounds at 502 were purchased by Mr. Hyde; and 506 by the Board of Directors.

NOTE:—For the early history of the work, I am indebted to Rev. Matt S. Jones, of Pueblo, Colo. For the facts concerning the present organization, I am indebted to Mrs. Abbie Adams, John D. Jones and Dr. G. G. Brown. We state with lament, all three have died since the writer came to Wichita.

Dr. Brown and Mr. Jones were Chairman and Secretary, respectively, of the Board of Management at the time of their deaths, both dying suddenly. Dr. Brown was a member of the State Committee, and Mr. Jones had been elected to succeed him. The names of both are irreparable from the history and development of the work.

In addition to the local organization and program, built up under the present Secretary, he has cooperated with the county, State and Region; and his leadership is counted upon in these areas. He is State Chairman of the Commission on World Outlook; member of Speakers Organization of the Student Associations of the State; Member State Boys' Work Committee, and the sub-committee on Hi-Y, Camp Wood, and "Cooperation with Girls Reserves." In addition he is a leader at Older Boys' Conferences, in three states; and also at Camp Wood. He was one of the organizers, Charter Members and first Chairman (served 3 years) of the Commission on Inter-Racial Good Will, Council of Churches; and is serving his second term as Secretary of the Commission. He is Deputy Commissioner, Boy Scouts; Secretary Wichita Ministerial League; Sponsor both Hi-Y and University Men; Secretary-Treasurer, South Central Athletic Association. For four years, a lecturer, Sumner assembly and Training School at Topeka.

In addition to the regular and cooperative work of the association, the leadership and influence of its Executive Secretary has been felt through every phase of community life. He is an officer and ardent worker in the American Legion. He is a member of the Alpha Phi Alpha (Intercollegiate Greek Letter) Fraternity; member the Executive Committee N. A. A. C. P., Superintendent of his Church School, and a Delegate to the World's Conference of the Y. M. C. A., Helsingfors, Finland, August, 1926.

*It Does Not Yet Appear What We Shall Be.

Facing the future, we can only say with the apostle Paul "I do not say that I have already won the race or have already reached perfection, but I am pressing on, striving to lay hold of the prize for which Christ has laid hold of me. The Association has two well equipped reading rooms, two recreation rooms, two shower baths, committee room, club room, office and kitchen. These facilities are divided between the two buildings. There are over three hundred book and references; and over one hundred current periodicals in the two reading rooms. Special attention is given to Negro Literature and Periodicals.

The Association owns lots 515-17-19-21 on North Water Street in addition to the two very splendid buildings and three lots on the corner. The work of the Association is vested in nine committees. Over fifty men and boys serve on the committees. This does not include the scouts, which have their own organization.

The Water Street Branch has sent from three to ten boys to Camp

Wood for six years; and has sent from five to fifteen to State, District, and County Older Boys' Conferences. In 1926, twenty-five boys were taken to the Boy Scout Camp for five days. Next year, with an equal number, we are to have ten days.

Two hundred and twenty-seven employment situations have been filled by men and boys. Many of them for only a days; others for steady employment.

\$25.00 was given to the support of the work in the flood area.

Over fifty different men and boys participate annually in the recreation and athletic program promoted by the Y. M. C. A.

The six o'clock devotional group that meets on Wednesday morning is one of the dynamic forces in the work of the Association. They are supporting the "C" in the Y. M. C. A.

There are 457 men and boys who have paid one, and four who have paid Ten Dollars to support the work.

We participate in the Community Chest as an active voting member.

NEWTON, KANSAS

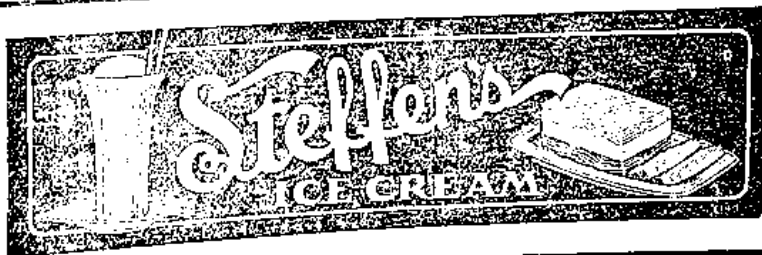
Population 10,000

Newton, Kansas is located on the main line of the Santa Fe, 185 miles west of Kansas City, 26 miles north of Wichita and 33 miles east of Hutchinson. Newton was founded and incorporated Feb. 2, 1872. It was proclaimed a city of the second class Jan. 9, 1910 and adopted commission form of government March 9, 1910. Elevation is 1,642 feet. Newton has the purest water in the United States, percentage being 99 and nine-tenths pure. Newton has many beautiful homes, churches, schools and well paved streets. The Mo. Pac. and the A. V. I. Interurban also enter the city. They have two large flour mills, many factories and one of the largest shops of the Santa Fe is also located here. This is the division for several lines over the Santa Fe. Newton has seven hundred negroes with a property value of over \$100,000 and the following business: Three churches, two cafes, two shining parlors, two barber shops. One of these shops being operated by Mr. Joe Teail, the Sanitary Barber shop is operated for whites exclusively. One beauty shop, the Rickman also operated for whites, one taxi line and one Billiard Parlor. We hope that the information here presented may be of service to the stranger within our gates, as well as to the residents of the city.
